Advocacy News



Australian Government
Department of Veterans' Affairs

I am writing to advise you of the 1 May 2018 commencement of two new measures designed to benefit veterans and their families. These measures were announced last year and have been mentioned during a recent meeting of the Ex-Service Organisation Round Table.

Veteran Payment

As part of DVA's commitment to improving access to services for veterans and their families, the new Veteran Payment is now available to eligible individuals and their partners. This payment provides interim financial support to veterans who cannot work or support themselves while they await liability decisions on claims for mental health conditions under either the *Military Rehabilitation and Compensation Act 2004* (MRCA) or the *Safety, Rehabilitation and Compensation (Defence-related Claims) Act 1988* (DRCA).

Extended Family Support Package

The Family Support Package is designed to extend family support under the MRCA for veterans and their families. There are two distinct groups that will benefit from this initiative: eligible veterans and their families, and eligible spouse or partner of deceased veterans. This initiative will provide guidance and financial support to alleviate pressures when needed the most. The time-limited support available include expanded childcare funding, additional counselling services and eligible widow(er)s will be entitled to home help.

I have enclosed DVA Factsheets which provide more information on these measures, including eligibility and payment details. If you have further questions or would like additional information, please contact the Department.


The widows lunch will be held in June please inform the Sub branch of your transport requirements when you receive your invitation.

I've had a full and productive life , and always paid my debts.


I have a wonderful family, my marriage was truly great.

Why the Emu Plume?

Slouch hats worn by members of the Armoured Corps are adorned with Emu plumes, a tradition that originated with the Queensland Mounted Infantry during the great shearers' strike in Queensland in 1891. During this time, the Queensland Mounted Infantry were called out, as soldiers to aid the Civil Power.

As time permitted, the soldiers would participate in a sporting activity where they would ride their horses alongside the emus, plucked the breast feathers, and placed the feathers on their hat. The Gympie Squadron was the first to wear the feathers, a fashion soon followed by the regiment.

The Queensland government permitted the Regiment to adopt the plume as part of its uniform in recognition of its service. In 1915 then Minister for Defence Sir G. F. Pearce granted all units of the Australian Light Horse permission to wear the plume, which they refer to as 'Kangaroo feathers'.

Emu tufts of approved design and dimensions are now worn by all members of the Royal Australian Armoured Corps as an item of dress. All Royal Australian Armoured Corps personnel were given authority to wear Emu plumes in the slouch hat, brim up or down in 1996, this was extended to all personnel serving in the Royal Australian Armoured Corps Regiment in 2000.

DID YOU KNOW?

A high ranking member of our Australian Army, whom shall remain nameless, visits us each February for the feathers from our Emus (we have an Emu Farm) which he and his wife then make into the adornment for the Slouch Hats, making quite a nice little business out of such. The Emu Feather is soft and coloured from light to dark along it's length. The Emu Feather is one of nature's most unique, as it features a *double* plume. The Emu and its cousin the Cassowary are the only birds in the world that have two feathers of the same length originating from the one *quill*.



Do you know the history of the famous Slouch Hat and why an Emu Plume?

Officially: Australian Army khaki fur felt slouch hat with pleated cotton puggaree, emu feather plume and leather chinstrap. The hat has a brown vinyl sweatband stamped with a broad arrow and faded maker's details. Eight staples have been punched through the left side of the sweatband. There are two brass riveted ventilation holes on either side of the crown and a hook behind the emu plume to secure the left side of the brim to the crown. Attached under the left brim is a Rising Sun badge and attached to the puggaree at the front of the hat is the 2 Cavalry Regiment badge showing an eagle and 'COURAGE'.

Recipe from Lorna Armstong

EASY AS 1-2-3 ICE CREAM (CHOCOLATE OR VANILLA)

Chocolate Ice Cream

- 600 ml whipping cream
- 395 g can condensed milk
- 1/3 cup baking cocoa powder OR at least 1 teaspoon Vanilla

Instructions for Chocolate Ice Cream

- 1 In a large bowl, using an electric mixer, beat 450 ml cream and the condensed milk together
- 2 In a small jug mix remaining cream and cocoa powder until smooth. Slowly add to the mixture beating well (For Vanilla ice cream, mix all ingredients together until smooth and thickened)
- 3 Pour into a loaf pan. Freeze for 4 hours or overnight. Scoop into cones or bowls to serve. Serves 6 – 8. Sprinkle with your favourite nuts or topping

"My Dad's Missing Medals"

It's funny how fate seems to follow us. With this story, I hope you will agree. 18 August 2012 Greg Warren called me about military medals that had come into his possession. He wanted them returned to their rightful owner. 20 August 2012. Greg dropped the medals into Cooroy Pomona RSL

I found a name and address in the medal container. It was for a Mrs P Bridle of Cooran so I found her number and phoned her. I said, "I'm with Cooroy Pomona RSL and a gentleman has just handed in a set of medals in a tin box with your name on it. Can you help me out?" There was silence on the other end followed by sobbing. "They are my Dad's missing medals" (Very emotional) "Tell me, is there a fob watch with the medals?" "Yes", I replied. "Oh, Mr Scott, this is wonderful news. When can we have them back?"

"I'll deliver them tomorrow at 10am. Will that do?" "Oh, yes please, that will be fine. We'll be waiting".

On the 21st August I was welcomed by Mr & Mrs Bridle where the handover took place. They were very pleased and grateful to get the medals back. Over a cup of coffee she told me how they had gone missing; Number one son chose to keep these in his custody. He placed the medals in an old wardrobe at some point before leaving for W.A. His ex-girlfriend, got all his worldly possessions and disposed of them. Greg Warren, who was a secondhand dealer acquired the wardrobe at an auction, and guess what...medals intact.

Mrs Bridle's Dad 'a sailor' of the Royal Navy served on HMS Ark Royal (an aircraft carrier). To put it in perspective, it was an aircraft from this carrier that crippled the German battleship Bismark with a torpedo.



13 November 1941 (a Friday) dawned the same as any other day except that things would change forever for the Ark Royal and the men who sailed on her. Some time after 1700 hours Ark Royal was struck by a German torpedo and began to list to port, and sank. Mrs Bridle's father was one of those reported by the Admiralty as missing in action. However, some time later his parents were notified he was alive and well and on his way home for leave. As you can imagine, the dear boy already had had quite an adventure. You'd think that was the end, but no. The Admiralty notified his parents that they'd put

him on the train in London bound for Plymouth, his home. The Luftwaffe (German Airforce) bombed his train. They blew it to pieces. And, surprise, surprise from the Admiralty "Your son is missing, presumed dead. Our sincerest condolences to you all" .

They say that every story should have a happy ending. Here it is. At midnight there was a knock on his parents' door. Standing there was their sailor son! It transpired that after the train was bombed and most of his clothes were blown off, he decided that train travel was not for him and he walked home. He survived the war.

As a postscript, the submarine that sank the Ark Royal was U81. Her captain was Lt Commander Gruggenburger. His description of the sinking of the Ark Royal can be read in the book "The Hunters and the Hunted" by Jochim Brennack. Neither Gruggenburger or U81 survived the war.






